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

Agape appeals for funds to city, as Senior Wellness Centre drains resources

Chomedey-based social services provider served 5,000 individuals last year

The Youth and Parents Agape Association announced a \$93,809 deficit for 2024 on June 27 during the Chomedey-based charity's annual general meeting.

In light of this, they are calling on the City of Laval to provide financial support for the Agape Senior Wellness Centre, which is drawing on more of Agape's financial resources than had previously been expected.

Situation 'stable'

In spite of the shortfall, the social service provider's executive-director was upbeat during an interview with *The Laval News*, describing Agape's situation as "stable."

"It's going to get better," said Kevin McLeod, adding that "of course, a lot of that money was due to our Senior Wellness Centre, a lack of funding that we're having there. But we need more money for the Senior Wellness Centre."

A drain on funding

McLeod explained during the meeting that rent alone for the Senior Wellness Centre in a Notre Dame Blvd. high-rise building costs \$100,000 per year. (The Agape administration also uses the centre's offices.)

"I'll be honest," he said. "This place cost us a lot of money. I'm not going to lie. It's a big reason why we closed our year at a very big negative."

He said Agape has been talking with the City of Laval, including Mayor Stéphane Boyer and Souvenir-Labelle city councillor Sandra El

Helou, about the city providing funding for the Senior Wellness Centre, as it has for years to the nearby Axion 50 Plus seniors centre.

Seeking help from city

"I think that there's misconception that the City of Laval sometimes would love that everyone goes to one place for joint services at Axion 50," said McLeod.

"I think, realistically speaking, my argument is

it's not going to happen, because trust has been broken and it's hard to build it back. And I think that English-speaking seniors want a place of belonging, that belongs to them, where there are English signs up, they speak in English and not feel discriminated against. I think that's what it comes down to."

Overall \$1.2 million budget

According to Agape's 2024 audited financial statements, operating the Senior Wellness Centre cost \$96,995, at a \$53,000 loss for Agape. The association's projected revenues for 2024-2025, from close to two dozen provincial, federal, private and self-financing sources, are a little over \$1.2 million.

In spite of the challenges, the board said in

their foreword to Agape's published report of activities that "this has been an exceptional year for Agape, with 2023-2024 marking a record in the number of English speakers served by our organization."

'Pride in our achievements'

From April 2023 to March 2024, according to the directors, Agape provided services, resources, presentations, referrals, emergency food relief and other essential support to more than 5,000 individuals.

"We take great pride in our achievements and firmly believe that our initiatives have significantly contributed to the mental and physical well-being of many English speakers," said the directors.

Agape benefited from a major cash windfall when the board decided to divest the organization of its children's daycare centre, selling it to a private operator. The six-figure sum, according to McLeod, has been deposited into a special fund to accumulate interest.

Handling clothes donations

While explaining some of the inner workings of Agape's operations, McLeod revealed that a certain portion of the items received as donations, such as clothes, are sometimes thrown out immediately if they are unusably defective because of damage, dirt or infestation. Better quality clothing may be sold to raise money.

Although he pointed out that food is never sold and always given away to the needy, McLeod said clothing is sold at a nominal cost, although "families in need are given clothing a hundred percent." Assistant director Ian Williams added that thrift shoppers hunting for fashionable used clothing will often drop by the Agape outlet on Notre Dame Blvd.

How alarmist influencers are distorting the climate debate

*Influencers fueling climate panic with their extremist rhetoric are
a danger to science-based public policy*

Toronto Globe and Mail columnist Gary Mason recently penned a column titled The country is on fire. Pierre Poilievre doesn't care. Columnists often don't choose their headlines, but this one was drawn directly from Mason's assertion about "the planet burning up."

The Frontier Centre for Public Policy recently released my study on Canada's looming threat of eco-extremism. It reveals how a distorted intellectual foundation on climate change fosters public fear and anxiety. Mason employed a familiar tactic: seizing on extreme weather incidents, like the recent forest fire near Fort McMurray, Alberta, and attributing them to climate change.

The United Nations Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC), the leading authority on climate science, presents a nuanced and tentative view. In her well-researched book Inconvenient Doubts, Joanne Marcotte outlines three key points about IPCC reports:

- They include varying degrees of confidence and probabilities, rarely mentioned by the media;
- Some statements refer to specific regions but are often generalized globally; and
- An extreme weather event becomes a disaster only if a region cannot respond effectively. Instead of providing nuance, Mason directly links the forest fire to climate change, calling it the "new normal." This reckless use of catastrophic language mirrors that of ideologues. The severity

and intensity of heat waves attributed to climate change and their regional impacts are still being debated. Describing the earth as "burning" or "on fire" is unscientific and misleading.

Journalists, often lacking scientific training, adopt alarmist language from their surroundings. Politicians eager to push climate policies resort to extreme rhetoric to generate urgency, while environmentalists abandon measured scientific language to build support and raise funds. Alarmism is so prevalent that prominent scientists criticize politicians and others for their language. Climate scientist Judith Curry, in her book Climate Uncertainty and Risk: Rethinking our Response, expresses concern about the current state of the debate. Scientists avoid terms like "burning planet" for good reason – it's ideological and activist language.

Just Stop Oil, a British extremist group, demands a halt to new fossil fuel licensing and production, using their bodies to block roads and bridges. The group claims that new fossil fuel extraction "will kill our children and condemn humanity to oblivion" and that human-induced climate change "will destroy human civilization unless emergency action is taken." This rhetoric is far removed from scientific reality.

Thankfully, this group doesn't operate in Canada, though groups like Extinction Rebellion, which engage in extreme acts like gluing themselves to objects, do. In 2022,

anarchists motivated by "decolonization" rhetoric and extreme hatred towards the energy industry attacked a pipeline worksite in B.C. Extremist groups in Canada and abroad are normalizing attacks on energy infrastructure based on distorted beliefs. "World on fire" rhetoric fuels this extremism.

Mason also weaponizes the virtue of caring, suggesting that because Poilievre doesn't endorse certain policies, he doesn't care about the planet. This ignores the complexity of the debate. No one can read minds to know Poilievre's true feelings.

Lastly, Mason erroneously links carbon taxes to combating climate change. One cannot confidently claim that higher carbon taxes would have prevented or mitigated the effects of this forest fire. Alarmist rhetoric not only distorts public policy debates but also harms the public.

My report on eco-extremism highlights the growing climate change anxiety among young people constantly exposed to unscientific alarmist language that is causing them to grow up in fear. Some young families are tragically even foregoing having children.

A fearful society – especially one driven by unfounded beliefs – is dangerous. Manipulators can exploit fearful people to support unnecessary and harmful policies. Influential voices must think carefully before they write, lest they contribute to this misguided discourse.

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Emergency sirens now installed all over Laval's territory

The City of Laval reports that following the enactment of by-law L-12933 in the autumn of 2022, a significant number of industrial companies located in Laval have complied and have installed emergency sirens designed to go off to alert the public if industrial accidents happen.

Sirens in the network have been designed to go off for events such as accidental toxic fume releases or explosions at companies where hazardous materials are stored or used in manufacturing processes.

Should a major industrial accident occur, according to the city – one of that threatens to cause widespread harm beyond the actual site of the industry – the siren will go off.

Its purpose is to quickly warn the population of the need to seek shelter. Laval joins the cities of Montreal and Victoriaville in implementing this policy.

“The security of the population is a priority, but also a shared responsibility,” said Laval city councillor and executive committee member Sandra Desmeules, who is responsible for public

safety dossiers.

“I salute the commitment of the industries involved here in this regard, and I invite all people in Laval to become informed on the right things to do in order to assure their security and that of those close to them in emergency situations.”

What to do if you hear the emergency siren

Proceed to and get into the nearest building. Close the windows and doors and shut down

the ventilation. Seal the doors and windows with caulking if possible.

Get away from the doors and windows.

Get information from the City of Laval website as well as from emergency text messages.

Sirens have been installed at companies located in industrial parks around the centre of île Jésus (around the border of Chomedey and Vimont), as well as in another industrial zone in the Saint-Vincent-de-Paul district. The sirens have a distinctive sound, rising and falling in tone over a period of several minutes.

Laval's marketing and communications dept. gets a second recognition

For the second year in a row, the City of Laval's marketing and communications division received a Gold Quill Award of Merit. This time it was for a campaign the city mounted last year to recruit summer employees.

The Gold Quills are awarded annually by the International Association of Business Communicators (IABC) to recognize excellence in strategic communications at the international level.

“All my congratulations to the teams for this global recognition,” said Mayor Stéphane Boyer. “Receiving this award the first time was a great honor. But getting it a second time shows without contradiction the expertise of the City of Laval's communications and

marketing service.

“Without doubt, everything is in place to get our citizens to contribute to their living space in order to turn it into an exceptional environment,” he added.

The goal of the 2023 recruiting campaign was to emphasize the attractiveness of the city's seasonal jobs to a target audience of young people who are currently being sought by many employers, while also promoting the positions as valuable work experience on professional as well as personal levels.

“It was on this basis of a shortage of seasonal labour that the City of Laval decided to hire 500 seasonal employees,” said Nathalie Monette, the City of Laval's chief of communications.

City reaches agreement in principle with its recreation workers

The City of Laval announced last week that it has reached an agreement in principle for a new collective agreement with 1,200 unionized employees working in the city's recreation services department.

“After more than two years of negotiations, I am happy with the conclusion of this agreement which allows us to assure all citizens that they will be getting quality recreation services, all while respecting their capacity to pay,” said Mayor Stéphane Boyer.

“Our main goal was to be able to achieve gains in efficiency for the city, while also being able to offer working conditions comparable to bordering cities.”

According to the city, the agreement, which is for six years, has resulted in gains for the employer and the residents, especially as regards the simplification of salary scales, greater mobility by the employees between recreational disciplines, and improved staff planning.

PM's Quebec lieutenant pitches Liberal successes – after Toronto by-election loss

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A few days after the Trudeau Liberals' humiliating by-election defeat in the "safe" Liberal stronghold of Toronto-St. Paul, Pablo Rodriguez, the Prime Minister's lieutenant for Quebec, was talking apologetically on the phone – long before he even got around to the actual purpose of the call.

The by-election impact

"I totally get what happened on Monday," said Pablo Rodriguez, the Member of Parliament for the Montreal riding of Honoré-Mercier.

"I mean, it's been rough for us," he told *Newsfirst Multimedia*. "But then again, it's not a general election, it's a by-election where people pass messages. And I think we understood very clearly that people are not happy with our stuff, that they feel the pain of the increased cost of life and all of that."

Undoing the damage

"But at the same time, when they're going to come into an election and make the final button when you change the government, that's a different thing, right? Because in a by-election, you send a message, and in an election, you choose your government. So, these are two different things."

While the ostensible purpose of the call was to remind us of the Liberals' more noteworthy accomplishments, the timing – coming virtually right after the by-election fiasco – left little doubt that the gears had been turning during recent Liberal caucus meetings in Ottawa, where

the operative phrase undoubtedly was damage control.

Pre-election year pitch

Thus Rodriguez, who is currently Minister of Transport in the Trudeau cabinet, went on to list the Liberal government's most significant achievements (this being a pre-election year, mind you, with the next official election date not expected before late next year – if the government hangs on to the end with crucial NDP support).

Among the accomplishments: Nationwide programs aimed at combating child poverty; massive investments in new and moderately-priced as well as low-income housing projects; the Canada Dental Care Plan (albeit largely at the insistence of the NDP, as a condition for their ongoing political support); and the Canadian Pharmacare Plan, initially covering medications for diabetes and contraception.

"I think we have a pretty good *bilan*," said the bilingual Rodriguez, using an interchangeable Québécois term that roughly translates to a balance sheet.

No election until late 2025

Regarding the ongoing viability of the Trudeau government's arrangement with the NDP, and whether it will last until the next scheduled election, Rodriguez said he felt confident there would be no election before October 2025.

"One of the most important things that Canada needs these days is stability," he said. "Stability, because the world – not just the country – is going through a tough situation, with the economic crisis that followed the pandemic, the cost of living that has increased, and the

impact of climate change."

"You can feel it through the wildfires and through the droughts. So, I think we need a stable government to lead the country during this period. And this deal with the NDP is offering that kind of stability."

Dealing with the deficit

In the Trudeau government's 2024 budget tabled in April by Liberal Finance Minister Chrystia Freeland, the federal deficit was projected to be \$39.8 billion in 2024-25, and \$38.9 billion in 2025-26, after which it would decline to \$20 billion by 2028-29.

When asked how the Liberals plan to pay for the massive amount of debt they have accumulated while in office for nearly a decade, Rodriguez noted that the official opposition Conservatives are demanding immediate spending reductions, without however specifying what they would cut.

"So, what we're saying, of course, is that we're going to reduce and put an end to the deficit, but not put at risk the people that need it the most, not have people really suffering, because the role of the government is to be there for those that need us," said Rodriguez.

Still on side with Trudeau

Several days prior to the interview with Rodriguez, former Ottawa-area Liberal MP Catherine McKenna became the first ex-Trudeau cabinet minister to go on record stating she felt it was time for the Liberals to seek a new leader – although she also expressed support for Justin Trudeau's accomplishments.

Rodriguez insisted he still strongly supports Justin Trudeau, noting that the Liberal prime minister "led us to three victories in the last three



elections – which is huge, right? ... and he has the strength and the energy to keep fighting. So, he will decide on what he wants to do. But I will follow him."

Finally, Rodriguez, who was first elected in 2004, confirmed that he has already made up his mind to seek a seventh term as the MP for Honoré-Mercier. (He lost once, in 2011, to the NDP, when the party surged during the so-called Orange Crush.)

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Record amount donated to the Red Cross

An essential organization in times of crisis in our territory

When a disaster strikes, the Red Cross

responds quickly to provide comfort, shelter, food aid, clothing and essential items to those affected. In Quebec, teams of volunteers are mobilized, on average, three to four times a day. The organization is present 24 hours a day, 365 days a year, to respond to immediate needs until the affected communities fully recover.

In Laval, for the period from April 1 in 2022 to March 31, 2023, 15 emergency situations took place, providing direct assistance to 112 Laval residents and training 55 volunteer recruits. Since the beginning of 2024, the Red Cross has already been mobilized several times in various neighborhoods of the city, demonstrating the continued importance of this support.

Highlights

The City of Laval's campaign is one of the largest corporate campaigns in Quebec for the Red Cross.

For an 8th consecutive year, the amount raised by active and retired staff is more than \$100,000.

Over the past 15 years, the City of Laval's corporate campaigns have donated more than \$1.2 million to the organization.

CFIB issues recommendations as Canada reviews Temporary Foreign Worker program

Country's agri-businesses want streamlined processes, small business lobby group says

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As the Trudeau government looks to overhaul its Temporary Foreign Worker (TFW) program, most agri-businesses say they are in favour of multi-employer work permits as an option, enabling employers to share foreign workers, according to new research undertaken by the Canadian Federation of Independent Business (CFIB).

Foreign worker 'poaching'

However, cautions the CFIB, the majority of agribusiness owners don't support sectoral and/or regional work permits, whether it's under the current or a new program structure, where a third party would recruit and dispatch a pool of foreign workers, as they fear such permits could facilitate employee poaching and thus hinder retention.

"While government is reviewing its TFW program, it needs to consider the practical needs of agri-businesses and the future of Canada's food security," said Juliette Nicolay, a CFIB policy analyst.

"Farmers are already struggling with chronic staffing shortages and when they turn to foreign labour, it's only as a last resort because they can't find anyone locally," she added. "That's concerning given Canada's ageing population and a perceived lack of interest among Canadian workers in a career in agriculture."

TFW hiring in Quebec

CFIB research found that three in 10 Canadian agri-businesses hired foreign workers in 2023. The reliance on foreign workers was even more pronounced in certain regions, such as Quebec (51%), and in agriculture sub-sectors characterized by labor intensive tasks, such as the fruits, vegetable and horticultural specialties (64%).

According to Employment and Social Development Canada (ESDC), among employers who hired TFWs, 92% said foreign workers helped them meet demand for their products or services, while 89% said that TFWs helped them stay in business.

CFIB maintains that there are many misconceptions around the TFW program, for example that TFWs aren't paid sufficient wages or they're mistreated by their employers.

Debunking TFW myths

In fact, the federation says, most (85%) TFWs are paid the same wage as Canadian full-time residents or citizens, and only 3.5% are paid less. They also note that the federal government conducts regular inspections to ensure health and safety of foreign workers, with 94% of employers inspected found to be compliant on 26 different criteria.

"While there may be isolated bad actors that should not be tolerated, agri-businesses highly value foreign workers, and they take time and effort to bring TFWs to Canada," said Francesca Basta, a CFIB research analyst.

"They cover costs that go beyond wages like housing, transport and health care. It is also common for farmers to have the same TFWs come back year after year. Some also sponsor foreign workers to become permanent residents."

CFIB's suggestions

To improve the TFW program's efficiency, the CFIB recommends that the federal government should consider:

- Reducing red tape associated with hiring

TFWs, notably streamlining the Labour

Market Impact Assessment (LMIA) process;

- Allowing for the sharing or transferring foreign workers as an option (e.g., multi-employer work permit);
- Indexing the housing deduction to inflation – it is currently \$30, which does not reflect real housing prices;
- Allowing employers to match the wages offered by another employer with an LMIA in the same area to strengthen retention and curtail poaching. Provisions under the Employer Compliance Regime currently limit this;
- Reimbursing the employer for the costs associated with the administration and enforcement of the compliance inspection, should the LMIA not be issued;
- And introduce a mechanism to compensate initial costs covered by the employer whose employee has been poached and streamlining access to new TFWs.

Both new and established residents will benefit from a glance at this handy list of services and Bylaws. Please note that the following information does not replace the provisions found in the official Bylaws.

AIR CONDITIONERS AND HEAT PUMPS



Air conditioners include heat pumps, central air conditioning systems, split units, and wall-mounted air conditioning units used to condition the air in a residence or heat a swimming pool.

Residents from the former municipality of Laval-sur-le-Lac must contact the Service de l'urbanisme as a specific bylaw applies to that sector. The water-cooled air conditioners are prohibited.

ALARMS

There are several types of residential and commercial alarms.

Alarm other than the "armed robbery" type

Burglar alarm: alarm triggered automatically in response to noise, movement or a break-in.

Panic button: alarm triggered by a person having a health problem or facing a life-threatening event.

"Armed robbery" alarm

Alarm triggered by a person to report that an armed robbery is underway.

False alarm

An alarm is false when it is triggered unnecessarily, incorrectly or for a reason other than the intended use of the device. This includes alarms set off by tests that generate a call to the 911 emergency call centre of Laval, by defective or substandard equipment, or by bad weather, excessive vibrations, power failures or neglect.



Fees

Fees are charged for all police interventions within a period of 183 days from the first intervention resulting from an unnecessary communication.

A communication is considered unnecessary when there is no evidence of an intruder, of a crime being perpetrated or attempted, or of any other threat to justify triggering the alarm system.

CANNABIS

Like other cities in Quebec, the City of Laval is responsible for regulating the use of cannabis in public and establishing a zoning for the cultivation and sale of cannabis on its territory.



It is forbidden to smoke or vaporize cannabis in all public places, indoors and outdoors, including on public roads and at events, and in all parks, green spaces, wooded areas and riverbanks on Laval territory. The same applies to large outdoor spaces, such as the Nature Centre and the Maison des arts.

Entry into force of the regulations on the production and sale of cannabis in Laval

On June 1, 2021, Laval city council adopted 2 municipal by-laws concerning cannabis. The first concerns its production and sale, the second the odour associated with its production. The new regulations apply to the production of cannabis in specific areas of the city, and are now in force within Laval city limits.

Zones for points of sale and production

The regulations require that a minimum distance or "white zone" be observed between points of sale of cannabis and school establishments as well as youth centres. The Laval by-laws call for white zones (305 metres) that are larger than the minimum 250-metre zones required under the Cannabis Regulation Act. In addition, the sale of cannabis is prohibited in zones located near school construction projects and vacant lots, which could eventually house schools. The implementation of retail branches is authorized only in specific commercial zones, mainly on large arterial roads where retail sales are authorized.

The by-law concerning odours associated with cannabis production is intended to prevent Laval residents from being exposed to odour nuisances stemming from the cultivation and warehousing of cannabis. Production is strictly limited to specific industrial zones and to four small agricultural zones far from residential neighbourhoods. The new production sites are required to use certified systems for eliminating odours generated by cannabis cultivation.

CARBON MONOXIDE DETECTOR

All property must be equipped with a mandatory carbon monoxide detector when there is a combustion appliance or direct access to an indoor parking garage.

If the property has several dwellings, its owner

must install a carbon monoxide detector in each dwelling.



Several cases of carbon monoxide poisoning are reported each year in Quebec. A carbon monoxide detector is the only device that can detect the presence of this gas and alert the residents. In order to keep all residents safe, homeowners are advised to install a carbon monoxide detector.

Any individual who violates a provision in this bylaw is committing an infraction and may be subject to fines.

Bylaw L-11015 concerning safety, well-being and sanitation in health and social services establishments has been repealed, effective September 1, 2019. Consequently, a childcare operating permit is no longer required.

However, a certificate of occupancy is still required. Visit the laval.ca website for information on the certificate of occupancy.

CODE OF ETHICS AND PROFESSIONAL CONDUCT FOR ELECTED OFFICIALS



The goals of the Code of ethics and professional conduct for Laval elected officials are to:

- Prioritize the values underlying the decisions of a member and contribute to a better understanding of the City's values.
- Establish standards behavioral norms that promote the integration of these values in the elected officials decision-making process and, in general, in their conduct as such.
- Prevent ethical conflicts and if they occur, help solve them effectively and responsibly.
- Ensure the implementation of control measures in regards to ethical breaches.

CHILD CARE



COLLECTION OF RESIDUAL MATERIALS



The City of Laval has adopted one new Bylaw L-12424 governing the sorting, handling and collection of residual materials. Residents are now required to sort materials and participate in the organic waste collection aimed at reducing the quantity of materials destined for landfills.

This bylaw concerns owners of single-family homes, plexes and apartment buildings, as well as industries, businesses and institutions (IBI).

Each residence serviced by Laval's water network is fitted with a connection system supplying water. The water inlet valve also called a "service box" is usually buried on the front side of the building and usually on property limits, between the City's right-of-way and that of the owner. Its location is marked by a 10-cm diameter metal disc located at ground-level, which also provides access to it.

The owners are responsible for the private portion of the connection system located on their property, as shown on the diagram. It is also the building owner's responsibility to ensure that the service box is clearly visible and unobstructed in order to facilitate its handling. Only city employees are allowed to handle the service box.

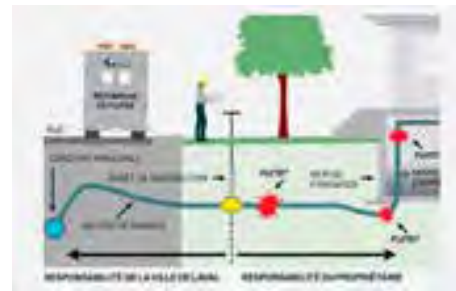
DISCONNECTION OF GUTTERS (EAVESTROUGHS)

Ville de Laval launched its gutter disconnection program in 2014, which is based on Bylaw L-11870 and is intended to upgrade gutter connection standards.

Since 2014, inspections have been carried out in the Auteuil, Vimont, Laval-West, Chomedey, Sainte-Rose, Fabreville, Laval-des-Rapides, Pont-Viau, Duvernay, Saint-François, Saint-Vincent-de-Paul and Sainte-Dorothée sectors.

In 2024, Laval plans to follow up on the recommendations suggested in the letters to citizens of the targeted neighbourhoods for a second inspection in 2023.

Ville de Laval also plans to conduct an initial inspection of rainwater gutters in residences located in the following neighbourhood.

EQUIPMENT USING DRINKING WATER CONTINUOUSLY



In August 2012, Ville de Laval adopted the Stratégie lavalaise d'économie d'eau potable to reduce the waste of drinking water.

In order to meet the objectives required by the Stratégie québécoise d'économie d'eau potable (SQEPP), the City of Laval has amended its by-law L - 12778 (PDE, 1Mo) on the consumption and use of water.

The by-law prohibits the use of devices that use drinking water continuously. If you are using

this type of equipment, they will have to be removed, replaced or modified to bring them into compliance.

FOSTER CARE FOR ADULTS



Bylaw L-11015 concerning safety, well-being and sanitation in health and social services establishments has been repealed, effective September 1, 2019.

However, a certificate of occupancy is still required. Visit the laval.ca website for information on the certificate of occupancy.

GARAGE SALE

Garage sales, being the exhibiting of vari-



ous merchandise with the intention of selling it in places other than a public market or a commercial establishment, are permitted as complimentary use of the dwelling. They are permitted for a single period of 2 consecutive days per residential building during the same calendar year.

No permit is required for a garage sale on the land of a residential building. However, to organize a garage sale on a municipal site, an authorization must first be requested.

INDOOR HEATING APPLIANCES AND FIREPLACES



Ville de Laval is concerned with providing a healthy environment for its population. Aware of the harmful effects on air quality and on the health of the community, bylaw L-12792 was adopted by municipal authorities to regulate the use of heating appliances and solid fuel fireplaces, located in inside a property, on Laval territory.

Mandatory declaration concerning heating appliances and indoor fireplaces

Effective May 4, 2021, all building owners who

have a heating appliance or an indoor fireplace must transmit a declaration to the City of Laval. This declaration form must be completed when an old appliance is removed or replaced or when a new appliance is installed.

To complete the form, you will need:

- Manufacturer's name
- Model name or number
- Appliance certification
- Number of grams per hour of particles emitted into the atmosphere

To complete the declaration form, log in to Mon dossier on the laval.ca website. Please note that you will need to create an account if this is your first visit.

MUNICIPAL PARKS



Ville de Laval has enacted a bylaw in order to enable you to fully and safely enjoy the many facilities at your disposal. This bylaw deals mostly with park hours, prohibitions and offences.

Park hours

Laval citizens can enjoy our municipal parks during the following times:

- From 7 a.m. to 10 p.m., except on sports

grounds where there is lighting and a game is under way, in which case, that area may stay open until 11:30 p.m.

NOISE

Under the bylaw regarding noise, residents must comply with the limits in effect in the daytime and at night.



Noise restrictions

At night (between 9 p.m. and 7 a.m.)

- **Outdoor noise:** Sound intensity measured within the limits of a property used in whole or in part for housing must not exceed 50 dB(A).
- **Noise inside an inhabited building:** Sound intensity must not exceed 40 dB(A) inside a bedroom and 45 dB(A) inside any other room used as housing.

During the day (between 7 a.m. and 9 p.m.)

- **Outdoor noise:** Sound intensity measured within the limits of a property used in whole or in part for housing must not exceed 55 dB(A).
- **Noise inside an inhabited building:** Sound intensity must not exceed 45 dB(A) inside a bedroom and 50 dB(A) inside any other room used as housing.

NUISANCES

Ville de Laval introduced a bylaw on nuisances in order to ensure a better quality environment and protect public health and safety.

Lawns and noxious plants



It is prohibited to maintain a lawn or weeds at a height of more than 20 cm on a property that has been built on, and at a height of more than 30 cm on a vacant property measuring less than 2,000 m². In addition to being unsightly, a poorly maintained property favours the spread of noxious or invasive plants in the neighbourhood.

Stagnant water

It is prohibited to keep a pond, a basin, an unmaintained swimming pool, or any other accumulation of stagnant water other than a stream on a property between June 1 and October 1. Stagnant water can become a breeding ground for mosquitoes.

Garbage

It is prohibited to let garbage accumulate on a

private property or to place garbage on a public road. A property where garbage and unused objects are allowed to collect is unsightly and can be harmful to the environment. In addition, it can cause stagnant water and foul odours to accumulate, and can attract certain harmful animals.

Soot and smoke

During combustion, a non-certified stove or fireplace that is poorly maintained or used will emit a large quantity of fine particles into the atmosphere. These particles can have harmful effects on human health and the environment.

Lighting

Most people prefer to sleep in darkness. However, blocking out light from outdoors completely can be difficult, even with opaque curtains. Please bear in mind that a light fixture must be positioned in such a way that the light falls only on the property where it is located.

OCCUPANCY AND MAINTENANCE OF HERITAGE BUILDINGS



In order to preserve buildings listed as holding heritage interest, the City of Laval has adopted a bylaw concerning the occupancy and maintenance of such buildings. This bylaw aims to maintain these buildings in good condition and prevent their deterioration.

Buildings targeted

About 2,600 buildings (primary and secondary buildings, residential or institutional, infrastructures, cemeteries, stations of the cross, calvaries, carnaries and burial vaults) are targeted under the bylaw concerning the occupancy and maintenance of buildings. They are listed in the pre-inventories and inventories carried out between 2015 and 2022 by specialized firms.

OIL-FIRED HEATING APPLIANCES



The City of Laval, in an effort to promote the transition to renewable energy sources and help reduce greenhouse gas emissions, has adopted Bylaw L-12964 concerning the application of a tax on oil-fired heating appliances. This tax aims to foster greater awareness of the environmental

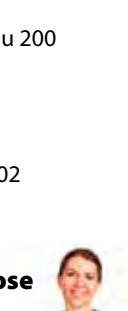
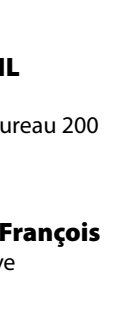

impact of oil-fired heating systems among residents and encourage them to convert their appliances to more eco-responsible sources of energy.

The impact of fuel oil on the environment

Heating with fuel oil accounts for the largest proportion of greenhouse gases (GHG) emitted by residential buildings. It causes 100 times more pollution than heating with hydroelectricity. At the time of adopting the regulation, the City of Laval estimated 13,000 oil-fired heating systems within its limits emitted approximately 42,614 tCO₂e/year, which is equivalent to the annual emissions generated by 12,175 cars.

OUTDOOR FIREPLACES AND COOKING APPLIANCES



The City of Laval reminds residents of the importance of complying with municipal regulations when using an outdoor fireplace. For the well-being of everyone, it is vital that residents observe the safety measures in force.

Before starting a fire, residents must be aware of the risks associated with the use of an outdoor fireplace, both in terms of safety and the environment. It is essential to consider the potential impact on neighbours so as to avoid any disagreements.

Non-compliance with the applicable regulations may result in fines and a prohibition on the use of a fireplace. In the event that the competent authority (firefighters) deems that the fire poses a danger to people and property, restrictive measures may be applied.

The City of Laval reminds residents that it is prohibited to use a fireplace during periods when smog warnings are in effect.

PARKING

A parking sticker is required to park vehicles on certain streets in Laval. Community organizations or public establishments with employees who offer physical, mental or psychosocial health care to residents at home can submit an application for an institutional parking sticker valid in residents-only street parking zones (SRRR).

Parking for Heavy Trucks



On-street parking is not allowed on Laval's public roads for road vehicle, or a combination of road vehicles, with a gross vehicle weight rating (GVWR) of 4,500 kg or more, recreational vehicle over 6 m in length and trailer.

Parking Permits

Street parking on streets reserved for residents is a bylaw allowing residents of a sector to park in zones reserved in their sector. Anyone possessing a car and a driver's license who lives in the designated zone can obtain a parking permit.

Snow Removal



Ville de Laval would like to remind snow removal contractors, business owners and citizens that piling snow on a public road is strictly prohibited, whether on the street, sidewalks or median strips.

Street Parking

Most on-street parking restrictions are in effect from October 1st to April 30th, as indicated by the signage in place throughout the majority of the area.

Since 2021, these parking restrictions are mandatory only during maintenance operations (street cleaning and sweeping, sidewalk main-

tenance, snow compacting, and snow blowing).



Trucking Network

Some of the highways in Laval are forbidden to heavy vehicles except for local delivery. You can consult the dynamic maps or downloadable PDF documents to verify which highways are accessible and their limitations to heavy vehicles.



PETS

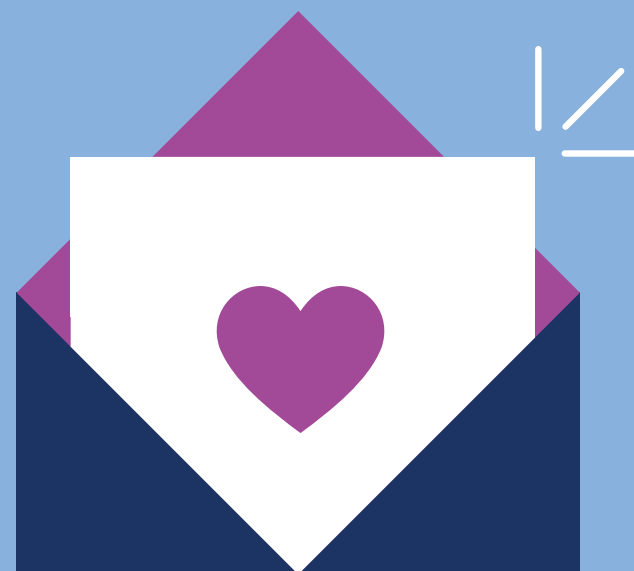
With the collaboration of an advisory committee made up in part of animal experts, Laval has drawn on best practices to establish its municipal by-law concerning animal control: L-12430.

Found or lost animals

If you find a pet with a municipal ID tag, please contact 311 so that its owner can be contacted. If the pet does not have an ID tag, you may be able to identify it through its microchip. To find out if the animal has a microchip, please bring it to Le Berger blanc, the organization responsible for animal services in Laval. When Le Berger Blanc receives a lost animal, it posts the animal's photo on its website in an effort to find the owner. If the owner cannot be found, the animal is put up for adoption.

If you find a dead animal within Laval city limits, please contact Le Berger Blanc at 450-629-0075.

Pet owners who lose an animal are invited to visit Le Berger blanc's website to find out if it is there. If it is not, it is possible that a resident took in the animal. In this case, the pet owner can post a photo of the animal in a public space where doing so is permitted, making sure to include his or her contact information.

PRE-EMPTIVE RIGHT



On June 9, 2022, the National Assembly of Québec adopted Bill 37, an Act to amend various legislative provisions mainly with respect to housing. The legislation amends several laws in the municipal domain in order to give municipalities, intermunicipal management boards and public transit authorities the power to acquire buildings by means of a pre-emptive right.

RAGWEED



Under municipal Bylaw L-5659 concerning ragweed, allowing ragweed to grow on a vacant or partly developed lot constitutes a nuisance,

and this by-law applies to lot owners, tenants and occupants.

The owner, tenant or occupant of a vacant or partly developed lot must ensure that the lot is free of ragweed before August 1 of every year.

If you observe ragweed in a field or on a vacant lot, please inform the city.

SMOKE DETECTORS



All properties must have a smoke detector (also called a smoke alarm) in working order. In the case of a multi-family building, the landlord must install a smoke detector in each housing unit. In a single-family home, each floor must have a smoke detector and the devices must be interconnected.

Make sure you verify, at least twice a year, if your alarm is working properly. Furthermore, change the batteries as needed, or at least twice a year when you change the time.

New regulation

As of April 2025, all residential buildings constructed before 1985 will have to be fitted

with smoke detectors equipped with a 10-year non-removable lithium battery.

Have your chimney, connecting pipes and flues connected to an appliance using solid fuel swept each year, ideally after April 1 of the current year and just before the first cold days.

SNOWMOBILES AND ATVS

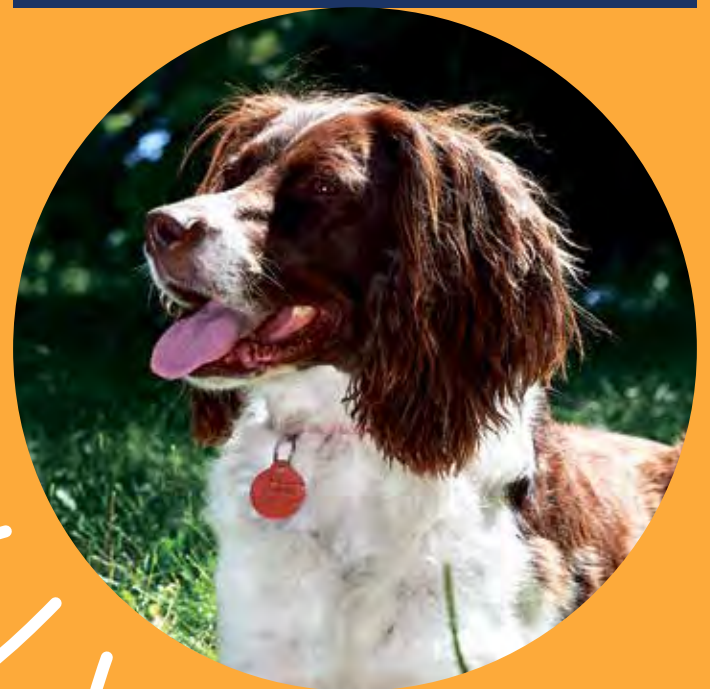
All-terrain vehicles and snowmobiles are authorized only between December 15 and March 31, and only along trails belonging to a recognized federation of which you must be a member. Please check with Laval quad snowmobile clubs to make sure the trails are open, since trails may be closed at any time for security reasons or weather conditions.



It is of interest to bear in mind, that the territory of Laval also includes waterfront areas and generally extends over half of the river and that no recognized trails run along these areas; consequently, it is prohibited to travel on the river. It should also be noted that our rivers often have strong currents in some spots and that the ice may be very thin there, exposing users of these vehicles to great risk.

TOWING AND VEHICLE SEIZURE



The municipal pound is in charge of seized, damaged or towed cars on its territory.

TREES IN RIGHT-OF-WAY AREAS



The City of Laval is responsible for maintaining trees on a public right-of-way, in accordance with the regulations concerning the use, development and maintenance of the unused portion of the public right-of-way.

Maintenance of trees in the right-of-way is included in the cyclical maintenance program, but any maintenance deemed to be urgent can be requested. To know the limit of the public right-of-way, you must refer to your certificate

of location, since its width may vary from one property to another.

Definitions

- **Public right-of-way:** The portion of a lot adjacent to a public way (a street or a sidewalk), which occupies a property but is owned by the city. This right-of-way can vary in size from one street to another and can measure up to 10 metres or more. The city can exercise its right to use these public installations (sidewalk, wiring, etc.) at any time.
- **Borderline tree:** A tree on both private and public property, or a tree overlapping the property limit between the 2. Under these circumstances, all property owners must provide their written consent to have any action taken on the tree in question.
- **Certificate of location:** A document including a report and a plan in which a land surveyor states a professional opinion concerning a situation or the current condition of a land in relation to property titles, the cadastre, and the applicable regulations and by-laws.

WATERING BYLAW



Drinking water is a precious resource, and the City takes the necessary measures to preserve it. This is why there are year-round regulations with specific time slots for watering lawns between May 1st and September 30th.

Description of the watering methods

Non-automatic watering system

A system that must be turned on and off manually, and does not require hand holding during use.

- Hoses that are perforated, weeping, porous or microporous are considered non-automatic watering systems.
- Hose equipped with a hand-held, release type shut-off device used specifically for watering lawns is also considered a non-automatic watering system.



Automatic watering system

Integrated piped system, programmable with timer that ensures automatic start and stop.

Hand-held hose with shut-off

Refers to watering with a hose, connected to a water system, equipped with a hand-held release closure during the period of use.



Watering can

Usually, a vessel with a spout used to sprinkle or pour water especially on plants.

WINTER CAR SHELTERS



Temporary car shelters may be erected as of October 15. The shelter must then be removed by April 30 of the following year.

Distance from public roads

The temporary car shelters are authorized only for residential buildings and must be located on the same land as the main building. The shelter must be installed so as to partially cover an access or parking driveway or space. No car shelter can be installed on a grass surface or a space not provided for this purpose.

This year, the Corporation Rose-Art's art exhibition is taking place from Thursday July 25 to Sunday July 28. Those with a discerning taste for fine sculpture and inspiring visual creation will be arriving from all over Quebec, as well as other parts of eastern Canada, for the 28th symposium.

Home to great artists

As always, the symposium will be taking place alongside the Rivière des Mille-Îles in the charming and historic Laval neighbourhood known as Vieux Sainte-Rose. The village is renowned as the birthplace of internationally-acclaimed Québécois painter Marc-Aurèle Fortin. Saint-Rose was also at one time the home of landscape painter Clarence Gagnon. 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Three dead following horrific truck/car collision on Route 335 in Laval



Accident investigators were on the scene all afternoon just before the start of the Canada Day long weekend, following a major accident involving a large truck and several cars on Route 335 in east end Laval, in which three people died.

The southbound truck crashed head-on with a car headed in the opposite direction, followed by a second collision involving another car. One of the impacted cars collided again into the truck, after which both caught fire.

The occupants of both vehicles, three people in all, died in the ensuing blaze. According to

reports, four other people, including a pregnant woman, suffered injuries, although not life-threatening.

The Laval Police announced five days after the crash that they are seeking witnesses. The investigation is still ongoing and the police are hoping to speak to anyone who was near the crash scene.

Minor arrested for allegedly fooling Laval seniors into giving up debit cards

The Laval Police have arrested an underage fraudster who allegedly convinced victims, including several seniors, to hand over their debit cards and personal IDs (PINs), which he then allegedly used to commit fraud.

The LPD believe that up to 30 fraud incidents may all be connected to the same suspect. As part of the scheme, he would call victims at home and pretend to represent a financial institution.

He would then tell his targets that their bank card had been defrauded. According to the LPD, the suspect used a classic ruse to deceive the victims.

"He would ask them to place their cards in an envelope and write the personal identification number (PIN) on the back," said an LPD spokesperson. "He then told them that a courier would pick up their cards at their home. Once retrieved, the cards were used to commit fraud at bank machines and businesses."

However, in a few cases the courier called the victims back in a multi-party conference call, so that they could speak directly with a real representative of their financial institution to reactivate their card, which had been blocked on suspicion of fraud.

SQ seizes illegal marijuana in Laval and Saint Jérôme

Officers with the Laval Police Dept. joined colleagues with the Sûreté du Québec in the execution of warrants, during which large quantities of illegally-produced marijuana as well as other narcotic substances were seized in Laval as well as in Saint Jérôme.

Officers executed the warrants at addresses on Fortin Blvd. in Laval and on 103rd Ave.

in Saint Jérôme. The following evidence was seized:

- Nearly 1,000 plants of marijuana;
- More than 100 kilos of marijuana;
- Nearly 30 tablets of methamphetamine;
- Nearly \$4,000 CDA in cash;
- Equipment used for the production of marijuana.

Laval man jailed in Gatineau for multiple locker room thefts

A 32-year-old man from Laval will be spending a good part of a two-and-a-half-year sentence behind bars after pleading guilty to a series of thefts from gymnasium lockers in Gatineau in Quebec's Outaouais region.

Evidence showed that since early 2022, Ahmad Mroue stole 36 smartphones, seven computer tablets and an unspecified number of key fobs and credit cards.

Among the incriminating evidence seized from him by police by the time they caught up was an Interac debit and credit card reader, which could be used to complete illegal financial transactions. Up to 15 police departments worked together on the

investigation leading to Mroue's eventual arrest. The investigators testified that Mroue confessed to having carried out \$220,000 worth of fraudulent acts in 16 different cities from January 2022 to January 2023.

Crime prevention experts warn that gymnasium locker rooms have become one of the most frequent targets for the theft of personal items, such as smartphones and wallets containing debit and credit card information, because of the vulnerability of gym lockers.

They recommend using a solid and reliable lock, or simply not storing key valuables in gym lockers because of the elevated risk of theft.

Laval police searching for potential victims of sexual crimes

Laval police believe that a man they arrested July 2nd as part of an investigation into sex crimes against teenage girls – may have had other victims, possibly elsewhere in Quebec.

Last Tuesday, Laval police arrested 21-year-old Laurent Bélanger. He has since been charged with luring a child, sexual interference, invitation to sexual touching and sexual assault.

According to authorities, Bélanger approached his alleged victims on social media in order to forge ties with them – establish trust – and meet them – during which he reportedly engaged in sexual contact.

"Once trust had been established, the suspect would have arranged meetings with the victims, during which he would have engaged in sexual contact," Laval police said in a press release. These allegations have not yet been proven in court.

Police specified that their investigators came into contact with alleged victims in several cities across Quebec, so that the management structure for investigations into serial crimes, coordinated by the Sûreté du Québec, was deployed.

Bélanger is due back in court August 26th.

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3 interesting migratory birds



Migration is when an animal moves from one region or habitat to another during a particular season. Many birds migrate twice a year. During the winter, they go south; in the spring, they return to the north. Here are some facts about three interesting migratory birds.

1. **Hummingbirds.** Calliope hummingbirds are long-distance migratory birds, travelling around 8,000 kilometres annually. They leave central and southern British Columbia and southern American West to reach Mexico.

Adult male calliope hummingbirds have purplish-red throat feathers.

2. **Arctic tern.** Every year, arctic terns migrate from the Arctic Circle to the Antarctic Circle. This is a round-trip journey of about 30,000 kilometres, making it one of the longest migrations of any bird species on the planet. Arctic terns can sleep and eat while gliding. They can also hover in midair, much like hummingbirds.
3. **Bar-headed goose.** Every spring, bar-headed geese migrate through the Himalayan mountains and above Mount Everest to their nesting grounds in Tibet. They must cross some of the highest peaks in the world, rising to 7,000 metres in altitude. Bar-headed geese can fly 100 kilometres per hour without wind to help them.

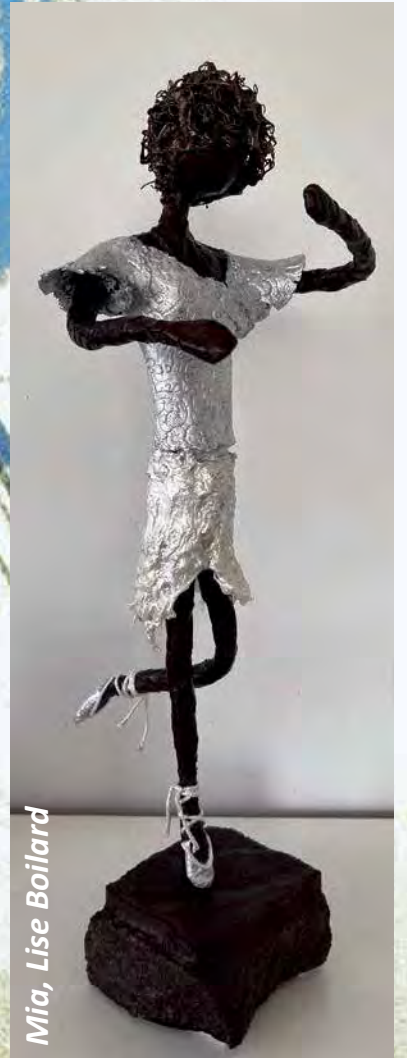

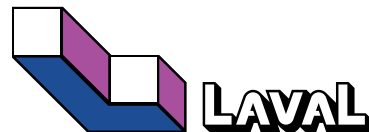
